2001-02 MINORITY UNDERGRADUATE RETENTION GRANT PROGRAM Annual Effectiveness Report

The Minority Undergraduate Retention Grant (MURG) Program was established by the State of Wisconsin Legislature in the 1985-87 biennial budget. 1986-87 was the first year an award was made under the program.

Awards under the MURG Program are made to Wisconsin resident minority undergraduates, excluding first year students, enrolled at least half-time in Wisconsin Technical College System Schools or non-profit, independent colleges and universities. There are 15 technical colleges and 25 non-profit colleges and universities participating in the program. According to statutes, a minority student is defined as a student who is either a Black American, American Indian, Hispanic, or Southeast Asian admitted to the United States after December 1, 1975.

Awards are base on financial need. There is a minimum grant of \$250 and a maximum grant of \$2,500 per year. If eligible, a student may receive the grant for up to eight semesters or 12 quarters. Assignment of funds is made based on the minority population at each participating school. This information is based on an annual survey of the schools. The University of Wisconsin System Administration has a similar program, the Lawton Grant, for students attending those institutions.

Nine pages of tables and graphs are attached. They show final figures for the 2001-02 academic year and the results of surveys of participating schools and student recipients.

- Pages 3 and 4 show the spending for the MURG Program for 2001-02 by sector and school.
- Page 5 shows the top five colleges or universities based on funding provided to students enrolled. 66.51 percent of the funds available were spent funding students enrolled at these schools. While the assignment is evenly divided between the two sectors, there are usually more awards for smaller amounts utilized in the Technical College Sector.
- Pages 6 and 7 show the results of the survey of participating schools.
- Pages 8 to 11 show the results of the survey of student recipients.

There were 622 recipients of a MURG in the 2001-02 academic year. 274 recipients attended a non-profit, independent college or university and 348 recipients attended a Wisconsin technical college. 18 percent of the recipients responded to the survey.

The results of the surveys of school and student recipients show that the MURG Program is very successful. Those individuals who were surveyed included students who received MURG Program grants during the 2001-02 academic year. Participating schools report that 79.26 percent of student recipients either completed their degree/certificate programs or continued to work towards obtaining their degree/certificate in 2002-03.

Among student recipients surveyed, 88.39 percent indicated that the grant positively affected their decision to return to or stay in school. 100 percent of the respondents either have earned a degree/certificate or continue to work towards obtaining a degree/certificate. In addition, over 83 percent of the recipients plan on living and working in Wisconsin for their working career.



Enrollment Status of Recipients




Did not positively affect decision 11.61%



Did positively affect decision 88.39%




